Stay Safe From These Travel Scams

According to the Federal Trade Commission, here are some of the most common travel scams:

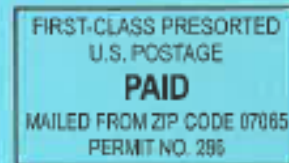
- Travel scam websites - Ads for "free" vacations or emails, calls, or text messages stating that you have won a vacation, even though you never entered to win one.
- Robocalls about vacation deals - You may get robocalls offering you vacation deals at a discounted price. These companies are trying to sell you something illegal unless the companies got written permission from you to call you that way.
- International travel document scams - Websites that claim to be able to get you an international travel visa, passport, or other documents. Some sites are legitimate businesses, while others are just copycats of official websites. These imposter sites charge you high fees, including fees for services that are free on the U.S. Department of State's website.

- International driving permit scams - Scammers create websites to sell fake IDPs, or try to sell them to you in person or some other way. If you buy a fake IDP, you'll be paying for a worthless document. But, even worse, you also could face legal problems or travel delays if you're detained for using it to drive in a foreign country.
- Vacation home scams - Scammers can hijack real rental listings and advertise them as their own, so when you show up for vacation, you find out that other people are also booked for the same property. Other scammers make up listings for places that aren't really for rent or don't exist. Searching online for the rental property's address, plus the name of the property owner or rental company listed, can help you avoid this scam.

How to Protect Yourself from Scams:

- Use Secure Payment Methods: Use credit cards for transactions, which offer better fraud protection than debit cards, wire transfers, or gift cards.
- Verify Listings: Research vacation rentals thoroughly, check reviews, and avoid deals that seem too good to be true.
- Don't Click Links: Do not click links in unexpected emails or texts regarding deliveries or services.
- Verify Official Sites: If you receive a notice about a utility or service, look up the official phone number yourself to verify, rather than using the contact info in the message.
- Beware of High Pressure: Scammers often push for immediate action.
